Amendments to the Contact Lens Mentor Policy and the Contact Lens Fittings Policy The College extended the temporary addenda to the Contact Lens Mentor policy and the Contact Lens Fittings policy. The addenda temporarily allow students to meet registration requirements by performing fittings in a roleplay/standardized patient setting in a classroom or simulated environment, rather than in a dispensary setting only, and extend eligibility to act as a contact lens mentor to instructors in accredited education programs. These temporary provisions are geared toward addressing student challenges regarding the completion of required fittings and the shortage of contact lens mentors identified by the opticianry program coordinators. The temporary provisions will remain in effect until December 31, 2023.

To offset the continued impact of the COVID-19 pandemic on registrants, registration fees were reduced by 12.5% in 2022 to ease the financial burden for registered opticians and help them meet their registration obligations for the year 2022.

The College launched information webinars for applicants from non-accredited educational institutions which provide an opportunity to learn about the Prior Learning Assessment and Recognition (PLAR) process and engage in an interactive session with the Registrar and the registration team. In anticipation of the launch of the new PLAR assessment tool, the College invited registered opticians to participate in the pilot project to test the new tool and offer feedback on their experience. This allowed to fine-tune the tool prior to its official launch thus creating a smoother experience for the applicants.

| 1 | <p>In 2022, the College administered four examination sessions, including two bilingual sessions. This initiative allowed the College to accommodate the needs of candidates whose program completion was delayed due to the COVID-19 pandemic. In 2022, 302 individuals completed the national examinations, which constitutes a 26% increase compared to 2021, and a 45% increase compared to pre-pandemic numbers.</p> |

Risk: Impact of the COVID-19 pandemic on the availability of opticianry services to the Ontario public and the ability of the College to meet the registration needs of applicants. Mitigation Measure: The College continued taking steps to mitigate the impact of the pandemic on applicants’ ability to enter the profession in a timely manner, and to ensure the availability of optician services to Ontarians. These steps included:

- Temporarily amending the registration policies to support student and intern opticians’ ability to meet registration requirements by permitting them to gain some or all of certain experiential requirements in a classroom or simulated setting, rather than limiting them to an optical dispensary setting.
- Offering additional examination sessions to ensure that applicants had timely opportunities to complete the examinations in Ontario and subsequently transition to full licensure.
- Introducing an incremental return to pre-pandemic registration fees to support registrant renewal.

Risk: Constraints under O. Reg 869/93 (Registration Regulation under the Opticianry Act, 1991). **Mitigation Measure:** The College's current Registration Regulation includes a number of provisions that preclude or impede the College from streamlining registration processes. For example, the regulation includes rigid and, at times, outdated practical experience requirements, limits access to PLAR, and precludes formal approval of new educational programs. The College is currently seeking amendments to the Registration Regulation. The proposed amendments will streamline many registration processes by removing many of the detailed requirements from the regulation itself so they can be addressed via by-law or policy. This will permit for greater flexibility and the ability to ensure registration requirements remain aligned with the realities of the practice environment, changing technologies and patient expectations. The amendments were submitted to the Ministry of Health in 2017 but are still awaiting approval. In the interim, the College has taken steps to work as efficiently as possible within the confines of the current regulation, such as interpreting access to PLAR as broadly as possible and deeming additional programs as equivalent to approved programs.

Risk: Constraints resulting from new expedited timelines for processing registration applications under O. Reg 508/22 (Registration Requirements). **Mitigation Measure:** While not necessarily a "risk", the establishment of expedited decision timelines under O. Reg. 508/22 has required reallocating College resources toward processing new applications and away from other registration functions, including licensing examinations and policy development. In the long term, this will likely also impact registration fees in order to maintain adequate resources in the department. To mitigate the impact, the College has added an additional staff member to the registration department.

The College does not require prior Canadian work experience in opticianry before an applicant can be registered. Applicants may complete the required minimum of 1000 hours of verified dispensing experience at any time prior to their registration as a registered optician in any jurisdiction. This requirement uniformly applies to Canadian and internationally trained applicants.
